
Why did heroes of look like ordinary people? Here's a story of four students who did exactly that!

This witticism sparked a protest that went all across the South. All they did was sit down but the actions spoke volumes. Greensboro Four taught us that anytime you sit down or stand up for what is right, you change the world. So the next time you are feeling powerless, remember the Greensboro Four.




FREEDOM HAIR





GRADY TATE'S WINDMILLS

Grady Tate, legendary, masterful, jazz drummer and vocalist. For more than six decades, Grady's distinctive sound has graced literally thousands of recordings and performances with such musical giants as Quincy Jones, Miles Davis, Duke Ellington, Ray Charles, Tony Bennett, Ella Fitzgerald, Aretha Franklin and Lena Horne.



Matt Pirkoff

As a drummer, Grady earned the reputation as one of the greatest jazz drummers of all time and arguably the most recorded musician in history. As a vocalist, Grady earned two Grammy nominations and left as his legacy the definitive version of the masterpiece 'Windmills of Your Mind'. Grady Tate's Windmills spends time with his jazz colleagues and captures intimate moments with jazz great Grady Tate.



Sol, a Black biracial young man, ran away from New York to Hawaii to start a new life. During a period of heightened radicalized violence on the US continent, he seeks a new "home." He's a hyper-driven escapist - training as a boxer, living out of his car, and seeking the "American dream" of opulent wealth. While well intended, Sol lacks balance, restraint, and roots.




DOVEY'S PROMISE (RUN TIME - 110 MIN)





WATER FOR LIFE

Water For Life explores the collision of water rights, Indigenous beliefs, and resource extraction through the lives of three community leaders in Central and South America. Our protagonists face harassment and death threats as they fight the powerful forces that threaten the environmental, cultural and economic survival of their communities.



Director of "WATER FOR LIFE" Will Parrinello

Will Parrinello – (Producer/Director) has been producing and directing award-winning documentaries for 30 years. His work has appeared on Netflix, PBS, ABC-TV, Discovery, A&E, MTV, Sundance Channel, ABC Australia, ARTE France, NHK, RAI, SkyTV, iTunes and Amazon Prime and at film festivals from Tribeca to Venice, Sundance to Cannes, Mountainfilm to Full Frame.

His credits include Mustang – Journey of Transformation, Emile Norman - By His Own Design, Dreaming of Tibet, Little Italy, Kerouac, Summer '82 - When Zappa Came to Sicily and the Emmy award-winning series The New Environmentalists.



1001 CUTS

001cuts explores the careers of the daughters of Title IX through the experiences of surgeons. Social and cultural change in the 1970's allowed for the opportunity to train and be included into this high stakes professional environment. This film documents the pervasive stereotypes and gender-based discrimination that persist within workplaces designed for, and still controlled by men.

STAMPILA

A middle-aged woman decides to overthrow the powerful oligarch who controls her country. Armed with only her wit and a stolen government stamp, she must outsmart the oligarch's henchmen, evade the secret police, and trick her countrymen into sparking a revolution. Facing off against armed riot police, water cannons, and deep fakes, she must stop the oligarch from stealing the people's money and making her country the poorest in Europe.



Directed byu David Larson

David Larson is a first time writer/director who grew up in Malibu, California. He received business degrees from Berkeley and Wharton, and worked on Wall Street. Following the September 11th attacks, David changed course and joined the Peace Corps serving first in West Africa and later Central Asia. David's first film, "Stampila" (The Stamp), chronicles the fictional overthrow of a real Moldovan oligarch, filmed on location in Moldova while the real oligarch was still in power.





THE FIGHT FOR BLACK LIVES

The Fight for Black Lives chronicles the ways that racial stress and the American healthcare system disadvantages the health of Black Americans. This health disparity is traced back to emancipation, which increased the Black mortality rate, in part, because formerly enslaved people had no access to formal health care even when they could pay. The film shows that there is nothing new about the disproportionate rate of Black mortality that was associated with the COVID-19 pandemic by showing that on almost all measures of health Black people in the United states live sicker and die younger.



"The Fight For Black Lives" Directed by Micere Keels

Micere Keels is a Professor in the Department of Comparative Human Development at the University of Chicago. Her research focuses on understanding how race, ethnicity, and poverty structure exposure to challenges that place people at risk for poor life outcomes. She is particularly invested in systems-change interventions that can narrow intergenerational inequities. This is her first attempt at using popular narrative forms to influence how people understand persistent inequities.

The injustice of high overall Black mortality and how it shows up in maternal and infant wellbeing is both personal and political for me. Within a 12-month period in my early 20s I went from my excessive menstrual bleeding not being taken seriously at the emergency room, to a doctor suggesting that the bleeding may be due to having a long-term untreated STD and recommending immediate precautionary medications before waiting for test results, to finally receiving the appropriate examination and diagnosis of large obstructive fibroids that were removed in expedited surgery. Fibroids that had been there so long they had begun to calcify. Fibroids that were identified only after I drove 45 minutes to begin seeing a female gynecologist of color.

"KEITH LAMAR SWEETS"

KEITH LAMAR: SWEET is a collaboration unfolding across and over the prison walls. It was inspired by a call between Keith LaMar and Samora Pinderhughes (Keith calling from death row), part of a series of interviews conducted as part of The Healing Project. Keith LaMar is a writer, poet, and musician who has spent over 30 years in solitary confinement on Death Row in Ohio after being framed for murder following the 1993 Lucasville Prison Riot. Our mission, through this film, is to free him from prison.



In the cruel dance of time, mothers and fathers who forsake their flesh and blood face a punishment more severe than any earthly retribution. Yet, amidst the shadows of abandonment, do these trees offer solace to the forsaken? Their branches may stretch wide, casting shelter upon the weary and the condemned, whispering a silent plea for redemption. For even in the darkest corners of neglect, the resilience of the human spirit yearns for the embrace of compassion.



Seenu Ramasamy

Seenu Ramasamy is an Indian filmmaker, screenwriter, and poet who predominantly works in Tamil cinema. He is known for directing the films Thenmerku Paruvakaatru (2010), Neerparavai (2012), and Dharma Durai (2016). He made his directorial debut with Koodal Nagar (2007). He garnered acclaim for Thenmerku Paruvakaatru, which won the 3 National Film Awards [Given by GOVT Of India] for Best

Growing up in America, youth do not have equitable access to resources or opportunities. Black youth in particular face historical and systemic disadvantages, leading to disparities in wealth creation later in life. "Change the System: Building Black Wealth" follows Oakland high school senior Otis Ward IV as he participates in a pilot program at UC Berkeley aimed at closing the racial wealth gap, while grappling with the pressures of leaving his hometown and charting his own path.






